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## ACADEMIA MEETS INDUSTRY: MAASAI MARA UNIVERSITY SIGNS AN MOU WITH KENYA NATIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY

The University hosted a delegation from Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KNCCI) to sign a collaboration MOU. This follows over eight months of meetings and deliberation that peaked with the signing of the MOU at the University. KNCCI President Dr. Erick Ruto and the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Peninah Aloo-Obudho appended their signatures to mark the beginning of transformative journey between academia and industry. The delegation of KNCCI comprised of the Chamber President, national leaders and all the regional Directors. The University was represented by the management, Directors, and a section of staff.

The objectives of the MOU touches a myriad of development areas aimed at empowering students, staff and businesses. These include the following:

- Research and Innovation
- Entrepreneurship, Incubation and Business Growth
- Training and Capacity Building
- Internships and Job Attachments
- Sustainable Development and Environmental Conservation
- And other areas of mutual interest.

This is the 4th MOU that KNCCI has signed with institutions of higher learning in Kenya. The speakers expressed optimism that in terms of implementation, this MOU will take the lead and be an example for replication. The collaboration presents a great opportunity for hands on skills in business growth in the competitive globalized technological world.

Mr. David Mpatiany, the South rift KNCCI Director noted the unique strategic location of the University, economic contribution and hence the need for the university to collaborate with the industry.

Dr. Ruto said that a lot of time has been lost in the process of developing the MOU and time is money in terms of business. "Now, we must run eight times faster because of the eight months that we lost." This stressed the need for timely and effective implementation of the MOU. He lamented that despite Africa being a demographic billionaire, it languishes in poverty, contributing a paltry 3% of world GDP. This is despite numerous opportunities including 60% of worlds" natural resources being in Africa.

The Vice Chancellor, Prof. Peninah Aloo Obudho, expressed her gratitude for this historic partnership as a step towards societal betterment and sustainable development, environmental management, economic and social empowerment. She said "change comes from such a small steps and we can make a great impact".

# INNOVATIONS COMMERCIALIZATION MEETING WITH COMPANY BUILDING AS A SERVICE (CBaaS) AND CENTURION SYSTEMS LIMITED (CSL)

Maasai Mara University has a number of Intellectual Properties (IPs) that have already been registered with various registration bodies in Kenya. The IPs are yet to be fully optimized as far as commercialization is concerned. It is for this reason that a meeting was held on Monday, 24th February, 2024 in the University Senate Boardroom between the University Research, Innovation & Outreach Division and two International Venture Capitalists i.e. Company Building as a Service (CBaaS) and Centurion Systems Limited (CSL). The meeting intended to commercialize some of the University registered Intellectual Properties (IPs) with CBaaS in an international platform. The team from Maasai Mara University was represented by Prof. Francis Mburu, Ag. DVC (Research, Innovation & Outreach). CBaaS was represented by the Company Co-Founder and Global Development Partner, Mr. Andre Verma from the Netherlands whereas CSL was represented by Dr. Kevit Desai, who is a Partner at CBaaS and the Co-Founder of CSL.

Three of the University registered innovations were presented to the investors. The students were requested to onboard their innovations to the CBaaS platform for evaluation to commence. This would be followed up by signing of License Agreements with the Innovators after which the innovators would receive 25% undiluted shares for three years as commercialization proceeds in United Kingdom (UK). Should the IP not have made significant profits after the three years, CBaaS will give it back to the Innovator with \$100,000 (approx. Ksh. 12.5M). The team also agreed to work on a joint MoU and formalize it in the soonest possible time.

## MAASA MARA UNIVERSITY PARTICIPATED IN THE INTERNATIONAL DAY ON ZERO TOLERANCE TO FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION

The University plays a crucial role in making the world a better place not only through education and research but also through community services, advocacy and empowerment. Such was manifested and cemented during the International Day to Zero Tolerance to FGM event held on 6th February, 2025 at Mosiro Ward in Narok East. The event was themed: *“Stepping up the Pace: Strengthening Alliances and Building Movements to End FGM/C.”*

The University participation was meant to raise awareness and mobilize action against the global FGM practice. This was good for Strengthening Partnerships and Building Movements. Key speakers, included Deputy County Commissioner Mr. Musa Salat, State Gender Director Ms. Agnes Ngeno, County Gender Officer Ms. Pauline Naini, and NGO representatives. They emphasized the importance of young girls reporting FGM cases and the government's commitment to prosecuting perpetrators. They called for collaborative action among stakeholders—students, educators, law enforcement, and community leaders—to strengthen reporting mechanisms, enforce laws, and support survivors.

Maasai Mara University was represented by Ms. Nadupoi Kishoyian (Gender Office) and Ms. Ruth Wanjiru (Health Unit). The university continues to promote respect, gender equity, and a future free from FGM. FGM is often linked to traditions, social norms, and misconceptions about purity, marriageability, and religious beliefs, despite no direct religious mandate for the practice.

The first ever Nyanza International Investment Conference of the Lake Region Economic Bloc was held in Kisumu City, Ciala Resort from 6th to 8th February by the Nyanza Professionals' Forum (NPF), in collaboration with the six county governments of the former Nyanza Province (Homa Bay, Kisii, Kisumu, Migori, Nyamira, and Siaya), the National Government, relevant National Government Agencies, and local and national private sector corporations, including private sector associations and organizations (PSOs).

The Deputy President Prof. Kithure Kindiki officially opened the event accompanied by high profile leaders including Cabinet Secretaries, Permanent Secretaries, Governors, National Government representatives, Members of Parliament, Vice-Chancellors, Parastatal Chairs, Diplomatic Corps, among others. # MAASAI MARA UNIVERSITY TO VENTURE IN WATER BOTTLING (MMARAQUA)

Growing drinking water demand and water scarcity have turned into a notable challenge in Kenya. Climate change, population growth, urbanization, water pollution and poor management of water resources have aggravated the issue of the water crisis, which affects economic activities, food security, education and health. The challenge of access to safe drinking water is more pronounced in Narok County due to the semi-arid nature of most parts of the County. Sustainable Development Goal number 6 calls for universal and equitable access to safe and affordable drinking water. The target is tracked with the indicator of safely managed drinking water services which encompasses drinking water from an improved water source that is free from faecal and priority chemical contamination. Contaminated waters are linked to transmission of diseases such as cholera, diarrhea, dysentery, hepatitis A, typhoid and polio. In the Absents or inadequate safe drinking water expose individuals to preventable health risks.

Through its international partnerships, the University received a donation of ECOH2O Nano-water filters capable of filtering out bacteria and any other impurities from water devoid of any chemicals involved. The University intends to use this technology to purify water from an identified spring

and bottle the same to have the Maasai Mara University natural mineral bottled water (MMARAQUA), kin to Keringet, Kabarnet and Mount Kenya Natural mineral water. On Wednesday 26th and Thursday 27th February 2025, a team of Scientists from the University visited several water sources within Narok County to collect water samples from Natural sources for laboratory testing. This exercise is intended to identify safe drinking water source which is sustainable for bottling purposes. The University purposes to speed up this process so that the MMARAQUA branded Natural Mineral water is a reality in the shortest time possible.

The water tanks were donated by the Chancellor, Dr. Vimal Shah after visiting the school and identifying water scarcity as one of the challenges facing the school.

The University staff underwent a training on the implementation of an Integrated Management System (QMS/EOMS/ISMS) at Osim Country Lodge in Narok and the process determination and system documentation work shop at Enkipai Hotel. The exercise was facilitated by a team from Great Konkors East Africa Limited Consultants: Martin Wekesa Nyongesa, Daniel Kinyingi, Samwel Onjolo Omollo.

Maasai Mara is the first University to be sensitized on this new IMS and is poised to be the first to be certified by Dec 2025.

The exercise was aimed at enabling the University achieve certification on the following three standards:

- ISO 9001: 2015-Quality Management System (QMS)
- ISO 21001:2018-Educational Organizations Management System (EOMS)
- ISO 27001:2022- Information Security Management System (ISMS)

The Vice-Chancellor Prof. Peninah Aloo-Obudho officially opened both workshops at Osim and Enkipai. She was accompanied by the DVC, AF&S. Prof James Nampushi, Acting DVC Research, innovation and outreach, Prof. Mburu, Registrar Academics Affairs, Dr. Fedrick Otieno and Registrar Administration and Strategy Mr. Samwel Partoip, Director TVETI Prof Stela Kirui, Deans of Schools, Heads of Department, Directors, management and staff. The Vice Chancellor emphasized the importance of the Standardization process as an important asset and tool for service efficiency, enhancing customer satisfaction, improving quality of education, strengthening IMS , reducing risks of cybercrimes and enhancing compliance with data protection laws.

Additionally, she mentioned that the process is a major step towards preparation for the Competence Based Education and aligning the University to conform to the global standards. The VC highlighted that the process will create a system that will profit the university and shape operations, hence the full support of management.

“With CBE, things will be upside down, it will not be business as usual. Lecturers will have to devise new ways to meet requirements of students, EOMS has the answer to CBE challenges”, said the VC. She emphasized that the year 2025 is the year of break-through, the year of celebration, the year of preaching achievements, success, teamwork and stability.
